February saw the first event for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. It was an event hosted by the Archbishop of Canterbury and was held at Lambeth Palace. The Archbishops office asked one person in each Faith community to be a co-ordinator and put together a list of guests from that community and to take charge of a 'treasure' or an article of faith to bring for the queen to see.

For the Hindu Community, secretary general Bharti Tailor was the person asked by Lambeth Palace to co-ordinate the Hindu invitation list. The list of Hindu guests forwarded to Lambeth Palace comprised of the following: Arjan Vekaria JP (HFB), Dr V P N Rao (HCUK), Dr Girdhari Bhan (VHP), Dr Raj Sharma (NCHT), Mr Nitin Palan (BAPs), Mr Pranav Bhanot (NHSF), Mr Arup Ganguly (A Year of Service), Sutapa das Brahmachari (ISKCON), Sudarshan Bhatia (Hindu Forum of Europe), Shaunaka Rishi Das (Oxford Centre for Hindu Studies), and Ms Bharti Tailor (ECRL). 11 of the 12 attended on the day.

A group of four people presented the chosen article of faith the **OM** to the Queen. The **OM** was made of fresh flowers, and Bharti Tailor as lead was asked to give a 30 second explanation about the object before handing over to others and to give opportunity for her Majesty to ask questions.

Being made of fresh flowers the **OM** was set up by Bharti first thing in the morning. The flowers were knotted in the traditional style of Indian garlands by Bellapetals of Harrow, who worked until late the night before to assure the flowers stayed fresh and at their best.

Dow Chemicals sponsorship of the Olympics.

Dow Chemical own Union Carbide the company responsible for the Bhopal disaster. We have been getting increasing number of complaints about this issue and so will no longer be forwarding Press releases and other emails from the London Olympic Committee Organising Group which has the Dow logo and name on them. A Campaign Steering group has been set up:

The aim of the group is to campaign has three main aims:

1. LOCOG the London Olympic Committee Organising group - Make a public apology to the People of Bhopal for being insensitive to their pain and feelings and taking such a toxic company as sponsors for an event that should bring unity, harmony and peace. The Olympic Games are meant to be a symbol of goodwill, equality and humanity.
2. That the Dow Chemical Company should not benefit from the Olympics, or the Legacy of the Olympics, and should not be awarded any further contracts or given the right to use the London Olympic Stadium image in its promotions.
3. Dow Chemicals should not be associated in any way shape or form with the Paralympics, this is a slap in the face for the people who were left disabled by the operation of the company in Bhopal, and their progeny who are being born with disabilities today. Let them make reparation to the people of Bhopal before they are seen at our Olympics. Dow cannot be allowed to 'clean' their conscience and image by sponsoring this event.

NERFN is a newly formed independent voluntary organisation.

NERFN wants to promote religious harmony in the North East by working with faith groups, statutory bodies and other organisations to promote education, social and economic well-being, community development, cohesion and good relations involving people of different faiths. NERFN hopes to achieve these objectives by:

- (i) Facilitating the collective interfaith voice of its members to regional and national bodies;
- (ii) providing a means for interfaith groups to speak and act together on social and community issues;
- (iii) developing projects, programmes and events that promote interfaith education, engagement and outreach within the region;
- (iv) promoting interfaith development work with specific areas of interest including (but not limited to) young people's and women's groups;
- (v) facilitating the engagement of public, private and third sector organisations with interfaith groups, and vice versa;
- (vi) being a source of information and support regarding funding and resources for interfaith action.

Vijaya said "Working with all faiths together with other organisations in partnership can make a big difference to our communities. Compassion and understanding our fellow neighbours can resolve most issues.
